



## Karl Kenneth Paul

March 19, 1924 - April 6, 2021

Karl Kenneth Paul, 97, passed away Tuesday, April 6, 2021 at Lake West Medical Center, Willoughby. He was born March 19, 1924, in Cleveland, moved to Willoughby Township (Eastlake) in 1931, and then to Mentor in 1958.

Karl graduated from Willoughby Union High School in 1942 and attended Ohio University. He served in World War II with the U.S. Army's 146th Engineer Combat Battalion in Europe.

He retired from Ohio Rubber Company as Traffic Manager, after 32 years of service.

Karl was a member of the Traffic Club of Cleveland since 1952, past president of the ORCO Management Club, the Western Reserve Traffic Club, and the Lost Nation Sylvaneers Camping Club. He also was a member of Mentor Senior Center.

Karl lived as a child through the Great Depression. He fought in Europe in World War II but rarely talked about it, except to teach his family the songs that he and his soldier buddies sang (cleaned up, mostly). He married, helped raise four daughters, and had his heart broken when his wife died in 1980.

He forged on, traveling often to see his daughters and their families. He attended countless sports events of his grandchildren in Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Illinois and Iowa. He took an active role in the lives of his great-grandchildren. He attended hundreds, maybe thousands, of Mentor High football, basketball, wrestling, baseball and ice hockey games and matches. The school honored him a couple times for his support.

And he played golf once or twice a week, right up into last fall. He gave up golf about 2,000 times because of his "stupid putter," but he always came back.

His family believes that just about anyone would want to grow up to be like Karl Paul.

He is survived by daughters, Karol (David) Liggett of Willoughby Hills; Susan (Stephen) Lyttle of Matthews, N.C.; Shari (Michael) Georgoff of Emmitsburg, MD; and Lauri (Jeffrey) Stoneking of Bettendorf, Iowa; 9 grandchildren: Elizabeth (Jason) Baker, Ryan (Shelley) Lyttle, Daniel Lyttle, Nicole (Kyle) Vaughn, Stephanie (Joshua) Munday, Meghan Georgoff, James Georgoff, Jack Stoneking and Nicholas Stoneking; 8 great-grandchildren; sister: Joan (Roger) Wells; brother-in-law, Phillip Smith; sister-in-law, Kaye Foley; and nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by wife, Anne; parents, Clarence and Ollie; and step-sister Marvene Bowman Henry.

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“ Karl was an absolute gem. One of the best things that happened to the Lyttle Family was moving next door to the Paul Family on Dartmoor Road in Mentor. Karl & Anne had four girls. Gene and Elsie had four boys. We got along so famously it was almost like having communal houses. And sure enough, my oldest brother Steve married Susan, the girl next door. We shared so many memories, throwing parties together, playing cards and especially attending Mentor High games. Karl was the ultimate Fighting Cardinal Super Fan. Passionate, loyal, dedicated. Traveled wherever Mentor did: Massillon, Canton, Youngstown, Upper Arlington, you name it. Memories of those trips with Karl are some of my most precious. When Dad had a crazy notion to try out country living and moved our family to Garrettsville, I stayed behind and lived with Karl and the Paul's while attending Lakeland and working part-time at the News-Herald. When Mom & Dad moved back to Mentor, they located on Hopkins, right across the street from the old football stadium. So Karl & Anne would come over for all the home games, park in our driveway and we had a pre-game and post-game ritual of coffee and donuts. For away games, we drove to Karl's house and he hauled us to wherever the Cardinals were playing.

Karl was a sports hound -- Mentor, THE Ohio State University, Indians, Browns -- so he and I, a sports writer, never ran out of things to talk about. He also was an avid (and damn good) golfer. The Lyttle Boys played a helluva lot of rounds with Karl. Eventually we all moved away from NE Ohio (save for Karol!), but I'd come back from Austin, TX, twice a year to visit. At some point after Karl turned 80, my brother Don and I began these annual summer pilgrimages to Mentor to visit family, friends and "Golf Your Guts Out" as we called it. Karl became a focal point of these excursions, all the way up to 2018 when he was 94. Don, his wife and I played every day. We thought Karl, now in his 90s, might just want a break now and then. But Karl always asked hopefully, "Are we playing tomorrow? ... Whatcha got lined up for US next?" Amazing! Several times Karl shot better than his age -- incredible. We got to think of him as basically indestructible.

Karl's understated humor, dry wit and wry smile will stay with us. His four fine daughters Karol, Susan, Shari and Lauri and remaining friends and family won't forget. And we all are better off for knowing him for so long. As someone remarked at my Mom's funeral (she was 91): "She didn't get cheated ... and neither did we." All of that and then some for Karl. God bless.
